# Graduates from Delta High School Often Say Best School Ever

"At risk" students are proud of their alma mater

The principal at Delta High School, Nathaniel Maas, has a problem; he is disturbed with the perception of "at risk" often associated with students at the Orcutt continuation high school. "Lots of people say our students are 'at risk'. That carries a lot of negative connotations. How did the impression evolve and how could it be so wrong?" he asks.

The three-year principal points out that students 'at risk' are simply not on track for graduation. "They may have not passed a class and for some reason are not meeting State of California standards for graduation at their high school. So the Delta continuation school objective is to help students meet those standards by accelerating a student in math or reading, economics or whatever and challenging them so they can get caught up."

Delta High School's graduation rate hovers around 90 percent. That statistic is comparable to a comprehensive school. The diploma a student receives at Delta indicates the student has met the same graduation requirements as any accredited high school in the state.

The school has been honored as a California Model Continuation High School for the past 14 years.

The enrollment at Delta is not static; it's calculated differently than at a comprehensive school. As soon as the student earns 205 credits, he or she

graduates, and another incoming student takes his or her place.

The graduation ceremony of 500 to 800 students over the course of a year takes place at a local high school. Last year the celebration was at Righetti. Maas says the festivities always include "caps, gowns, balloons and crying grandmas."

The curriculum at Delta is based on three metrics: academics, attendance and behavior. The principal says almost all students do much better with these metrics than in their previous schools.

"Our teaching staff of 13 tries to find areas students are good at and build on those areas. Once students see success, we encourage them to engage in an area where they have struggled. They become confident in their ability to learn. We teach them there is not a discipline that they cannot master," Maas explains.

As an example of Delta student success, Maas reflects on the school's robotics 12-person team which recently won eight consecutive matches to place third among 34 statewide teams. The team has built three robots this school season.

Their instructor, Jeff Cooper, also teaches economics and history. Before teaching at Delta, he taught accelerated and college prep students at a comprehensive school in the Santa Maria Joint Union High School District.

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# County Animal Services Offering "Name Your Price" for November Adoptions

Sarah Aguilar herds cats...and dogs, and ducks. Even pythons.

And that's for openers. Sarah Aguilar is the Director of Animal Services for Santa Barbara County.

The flagship for County Animal Services is on 3 acres at 548 W. Foster Road with satellite facilities in Lompoc and Santa

dogs, 114 cats, four rabbits, six birds, a python and a chameleon.

Aguilar also supervises all three County shelters. The shelters are facing a critical situation with the volume of animals in need of homes and are reaching out to the community for support. Animal Services has announced an expansion of operating hours to Tuesday through Sunday, between 10:00AM and 6PM, closed on Monday and holidays.

In an effort to find homes for the approximately 1000 animals at the shelters or in foster homes, Animal Services is featuring a "Name Your Price" adoption option in November. The license fee for dogs is \$13 for a year. After you have paid for the license, "just name the price you are comfortable with," says Annie Funes, Marketing and Events Coordinator. This includes vaccinations, spay or neuter and a microchip.

"If you get a dog from Craigslist, a breeder or even a friend, you will have additional costs for vaccinations and microchips. When you adopt from County Animal Services, all of these are included," Aguilar explains.

All three shelters in the County are "no kill" facilities. The acceptable not know their dog is barking when they

Barbara. At last count the shelter had 65 benchmark for a "no kill" designation are not at home." is 90% placement of animals. "We have exceeded that for several years. We treat each animal as an individual and identify each animal's needs to find placement for as many pets as possible."

> There are nine animal control officers who are assigned to the three offices. Also available are seven contract veterinarians who work when they are available. For animals with broken bones, major diseases or behavioral issues, outside contract help is used and often paid for by non-profit partners. The biggest partner is the Santa Maria based Animal Care Foundation of Santa Barbara County.

> Non-emergency Animal Services assistance for barking, fights, lost and found is available by calling (833) 422-8413.

> Aguilar emphasizes that for emergency incidents such as biting, chasing, aggressive behavior, or an animal attacking a pet, you should call 911.

> Complaints about barking dogs are tough to handle. "You need documentation, and you must go to court with a civil complaint. The best first step is to talk to your neighbor. They might

"We always need volunteers." Aguilar says. "Volunteers help with marketing, writing press releases, sterilizing surgical packs, helping with laundry, taking photos, fundraising. Anybody with any talent, we can use!"

If you are interested in volunteering or in creating a foster home for an animal until a permanent home can be found, please visit the Foster Road facility directly or call (833) 422 8413.

Recently, Aguilar says she walked into a cat room and four cats climbed into her lap and went to sleep. "The animals are isolated, away from people twenty plus hours a day. Volunteers coming to spend time with them is so important to the animals' well being."

Aguilar says if you want information about animal services, "we don't have enough people to answer phones, and because we don't know a lot about stray pets or which pets might be good fit for your family, we encourage folks to come into the shelter. Please use the website SBCAnimalServices.org. It has all the information about what we do and how you can adopt or volunteer."

# **Volunteers with Heat Seeking Drone Help Find Lost Pets**

Willow, a seven-year-old German Shepherd, had been missing for three days when her owners, Allen, Holly and Aden Johnson solicited help from Orcutt resident Geoff Clinton, a volunteer who uses a high tech, infrared heat drone to help find lost pets. Clinton was an animal control officer for over 20 years and still spends his spare time helping to find lost pets.

Also on board to help find Willow is Debbie Warren, creator of the local FaceBook page called Orcutt/Santa Maria Lost And Found Pets. Warren, an Orcutt resident since 1988, is a lifelong pet rescuer. She will often be found barefoot "because

it's easier to run," and is known to spend nights in drainage ditches coaxing a lost pet to trust her.

Willow's search team meets one evening at the IHOP Resturant in Santa Maria and then moves to a nearby parking lot based on a reported sighting of a loose German Shepherd in the area.

Sightings help determine where to locate the drone. Cinton sets the drone off from a fold-up landing pad; it hovers with red and green lights flashing, before gliding away. Holding a seven-inch screen, he designated the search temperature to be 85 to 101°.

Immediately Clinton saw cats, "clear as if

usually feral," he said. The drone performs best at night but is functional in daylight and in fog. It searches two square miles in 15 minutes with a 40 minute battery life and can zoom in on a mouse from 400 feet."

No sign of Willow and the team moves to East Jones and Suey Roads. Clinton likes to set up away from busy roads because drivers get distracted when

seeing the drone.

Still no Willow, so the team moves to near Pioneer High School. Unfortunately after three hours of searching, the team must give up, but only for the night. Clinton and Warren suggest that the Johnsons make posters using a bright colored background

and an 8 x 10 photo of Willow. "Put them on fence posts, lamp-posts and places with lots of traffic like shopping centers where they will be easily seen," said Warren.

After spending the evening trying to find Willow, Warren headed to Waller Park by herself to look for a lost husky.

Warren explains the shelter on Foster Road is over-full, probably because of a tough economy. People are not having pets fixed and not picking up lost pets after they are found by others and brought to the shelter. Her FaceBook page, Orcutt/

I was viewing them on a TV; these cats are Santa Maria Lost and Found Pets, has over 12,000 members who use the page to help find lost pets.

> She says she is excited to have Clinton's infrared drone as an additional tool to help reunite lost pets with their owners.

> Warren and Clinton are working on getting non-profit status and corporate sponsorships which would help them continue to offer services for free. Clinton

> > hopes to have other people train to get a remote pilot's certificate license for drones and join him in helping people find their pets.

> > Willow and the Johnson family have a happy ending. After ten long days and nights, Willow is found. After a reported sighting at the Betteravia Road Chevron

truck stop, Clinton's drone found a "heat signature" in a nearby field. A relieved and exuberant Willow is welcomed home to her family!

# **Investing Time, Training in Student Safety**

For employees of the Orcutt Union emergencies. School District, nothing is more important than the safety, health, and wellbeing of the 4,800 students we are proud to serve. Student safety truly is our No. 1 priority.

This school year, in concert with other school districts, law enforcement, and first responders from around the county, we have chosen to make safety training a focus. We have brought on a safety expert to train staff, refreshed our emergency plans, engaged all employees in discussions about how to respond to various crisis scenarios, and implemented physical security measures. Following is a report on our progress.

Orcutt's efforts come as part of a countywide emphasis on school safety. With support from law enforcement and fire departments, school districts have adopted the Standard Response Protocol (SRP) for reacting to emergency situations. Developed by the I Love U Guys Foundation, a national organization devoted to school and community safety, the SRP gives schools common practices and a common vocabulary for handling September 5 professional development

The SRP consists of five separate protocols. "Hold" means teachers and students remain in their rooms or area and is used when hallways or a section of the campus need to be kept clear. "Secure" means everyone on campus needs to get inside and lock outside doors and is used to safeguard classroom occupants when there is a threat or hazard outside the school building. A "Lockdown" is called when there is an active assailant on campus and is used to secure and barricade individual rooms and keep occupants quiet and in place. "Shelter" is initiated for group and self protection during a weather emergency, earthquake, or Hazmat spill or release. "Evacuate" is called when there is a need to move people from one location to another for safety

Our employees were trained in the Standard Response Protocol by law enforcement veteran and nationally recognized security expert Jeff Solomon during the morning portion of the district's

day. Solomon's presentation was followed in the afternoon by site sessions in which principals guided their staffs through a review of site emergency teams and their responsibilities, district emergency plans, and school safety plans.

Solomon returned at our most recent professional development day on November 1 to present on how to respond to active assailants. He emphasized the importance of physical measures such as keeping classroom and building doors locked during the school day, and we have implemented that practice. In the afternoon, staffs reviewed the SRP, discussed how to communicate with each other during emergencies, and completed the initial portion of Stop the Bleed training.

"Emergencies can and do happen, and this training is helping all of us to be ready for a lot of different possibilities," says Cheri Palin, office manager of Alice Shaw School. "The staff dialogue has been very valuable."

"I love the consistency across the district in terms of responses and terminology,"

says Molly Johnston, vice-principal of Orcutt Junior High School. "This has been a huge step forward."

"The training on Stop the Bleed was fantastic," says Orcutt Academy K-8 teacher Shauna Wilson. "I feel confident now that given that situation I could respond appropriately."

Our work on school safety is multifaceted in that it includes planning, training, physical security, and actual practice. It also will be ongoing, as we will continually revisit our plans and practice the components of the Standard Response Protocol. We regard our work so far this year as a critically important investment in student safety and will keep you posted on our efforts.

Maas says teachers at Delta also may teach art, drama, web design or whatever will help a student succeed.


Heather Ortiz teaches sewing. Her students learn the basics of fabrics, using the sewing machine and stitching. One of her students, 16-year-old Elena, while making pajamas says, "I like Delta, I feel comfortable here. At my previous school I felt like I was being pushed through the system. Nobody really cared."

Maas explains the staff is not concerned that every student is on the same page. "The emphasis on personal, individual success counters the loss of esteem that comes from repeated negative consequences. This may cause depression and may stimulate negative behavior."

Security at Delta is under the direction of Sebastian Perez. He says the atmosphere at Delta is significantly different than on the campus of a comprehensive school. "We try to be proactive; if we see tensions between students, we solve disagreements before they escalate."

However, Maas also says Sebastian can control almost any situation, "he has a black belt in jujitsu."

A typical day at Delta is divided into two sessions. The morning session runs from

8:30 to 11:30 AM; the afternoon from 12:30 to 3:30 PM.

The lunch hour between sessions is usually filled with students who voluntarily come for sports or robotics or whatever other activity they are interested in. Each session has about 200 students. The entire student body convenes on Friday mornings. Afternoon staff development concludes the state mandates that the students be in class 15 hours a week.

Maas says many students come from home situations that are not ideal. "Several students are sleeping on mats. Sometimes the home environment is not conducive to maximum learning." Many students have employment to help to support their

Statewide research says that Delta grads attend college or trade schools at lower numbers than students from comprehensive schools. However, Steve Molina, current director of Student Services for the high school district and former Righetti principal, says research shows college or trade school enrollments from Delta are low for the first couple of years after graduation. However, after three or four years, the numbers jump. Many former Delta students enroll in universities in Texas, Colorado and California.

A few days after accepting the principal position, Maas was invited to visit the Element Christian Church across the street from the Delta campus on Bethany Lane. The congregation had built a storage shed full of clothes and school supplies that the school has access to 24/7. He was told it would always be available and is full of necessities for students and their families.

Members of the church support the school in other various ways; they have provided holiday dinners, prom dresses, Halloween and Valentine activities. Maas says the "kindness they have for our students is amazing."

"No, we don't offer all the enrichment classes that comprehensive schools can offer; but our students feel the love and support they need at whatever academic stage they are at. Delta students meet the same standards as every high school student in California. I am proud of the work we see here. Whatever label a student has coming into Delta becomes history. Often, I hear parents say, 'I have my kid back."

Glynda Maddaleno is the Dean of Students at Delta. As her principal is leaving her office, we ask how she feels about her job. She yells, "best school ever."

She should know. Glynda, a certificated teacher, graduated from Delta High School. Steve Southwick reporting

# Birdwatching in Orcutt and the Central Coast of California



The Central Coast of California (Santa Barbara to Morro Bay) is one of the premier birdwatching locations in the United States, if not the world. While the Orcutt/Santa Maria area doesn't have the birding reputation of Santa Barbara or Morro Bay, it is still an incredible location for diverse and rare birds. In the future I will highlight rarities, migrants, backyard birds and

California specialties.

A few weeks ago, a really cool rare bird showed up in the northwest portion of the Santa Maria Cemetery. A male bird called a vermilion flycatcher, common in Arizona and Texas but quite rare here, has been reported numerous times. This little flycatcher (sparrow sized) is one of the most striking birds found in the United States. The male is bright red with dark wings. He is relatively easy to identify. He likes to perch in open locations (power lines and on exposed tree limbs). From there, he hunts insects. He will swoop down to catch his prey and then return to his exposed hunting perch.

While vermilion flycatchers are somewhat rare for our area, when they do show up in the winter, they usually stick around until spring. Another vermilion flycatcher has been reported at Jack O'Connell Park in Guadalupe, and has returned to this location for the last few years. He can be found near the parking lot.

We apologize for the incorrect information.



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


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# Orcutt's Heydey at the Turn of the Last Century



Orcutt experienced its heyday between 1904 and 1920, becoming a larger trading center than Santa Maria. By 1906, the town had two general stores, a furnishing store, a millinery shop, a vegetable and fruit market, a meat market, an ice cream parlor, two restaurants, a hotel, three saloons, two barber shops, a livery stable, a blacksmith shop, a post office, a shoe store, three oil well supply companies, a railway depot and siding, the Union Oil Company headquarters and the offices of the local Standard Oil Company operations. James F. Forbes built the first store in Orcutt, part of which consisted of the old Graciosa School, which he had moved from the southwest corner of Clark Avenue and Marcum Street to his property on the southwest corner of Clark Avenue and Broadway. The entire

structure, however, was destroyed by fire in 1910. In fact, most of the commercial structures constructed during Orcutt's initial period of development were in later years destroyed by fire or torn down.

According to Adelina Phillips, descendant of the pioneer Marcum family and longtime Orcutt area resident, the only commercial building remaining is the Commercial Hotel. It was built in 1905 and operated by members of the Marcum family. During the early development period, the town's residential area also grew. Twitchell's Addition was laid out north of the original town; that is, on the north side of Clark Avenue. Gray's Division was just east of First Street. Longtime Orcutt residents maintain that some of the original homes built in these sections of town are still in use. By 1921, the town had grown to include a hospital, a bank, a reading room and branch library, a church, a school, three garages and filling stations, and two dance halls. The locally prominent Orcutt Mercantile was built in 1911 on the southwest corner of Clark Avenue and Broadway, after James F. Forbes' first store was destroyed. A landmark in Orcutt for many years, it too burned down in 1959. The first official Orcutt School, a tworoom, wooden structure, was located on the north side of the 300 block of Clark Avenue. It was torn down in the early 1920s. However, the hospital, church, and bank buildings are still standing. While many people lived and worked in the town, a large population center also developed in the hills to the south. Oil workers' camps were established among the derricks on the hillsides. Workers and their families lived there for years, first in "tent cities" and later in cottages. Many of the houses were built by the Union Oil Company employees. The population in the hills was large enough to require the forma-tion of three additional school districts between 1904 and 1908. Bicknell and Careaga districts, established in 1904, were south of the Graciosa Ridge. The Newlove School District, established in 1908, was located on Union Oil Company prop¬erty on Newlove Hill (now called Orcutt Hill) just southeast of Old Town Orcutt. The school constructed by the district is the only early

school building remaining in the Orcutt area. A large, two-room structure, it is used today for community gatherings.

Public services in the Orcutt area were primitive in the boom years. There was no public sewer, electricity, or fire protection in the town until the 1920s. Roads were unpaved for many years. The main oiled County Road, laid out in 1861, came up from Santa Barbara, passed through Los Alamos, ran westward, down the San Antonio Valley and turned northward through the Graciosa Pass. The road veered right to turn into Orcutt (where it was called Clark Avenue), proceeded through the heart of town, and then turned left to continue running northward toward Santa Maria. It was taken into the state highway system in 1909 and renumbered Route 2, but no improvements were made until 1915. The road was also a segment of the main San Francisco-to-San Diego coastal highway. Travelers stopped to eat and rest in Orcutt; their patronage was important to the local economy for many years.
