Book Some Library Time: Little Libraries Finding Homes in Orcutt

In a world where more people are looking down at their phones than at the world around them, members of small communities across the country have embraced the idea of neighborhood book exchanges. These free lending libraries are often barely bigger than a mailbox placed in front of a home and encourage anyone who passes by to browse the selection of books inside, take one if it catches their interest, and leave one behind if they can.

In 2009 Todd Bol created the first official Little Free Library and placed it in the front yard of his Wisconsin home as a tribute to his mother who was a teacher and book lover. Today there are more than 80,000 Little Free Libraries all around the world, according to their site. And that's not counting those book exchanges that have been erected by individuals not registered with the non-profit. The idea is to make reading accessible to all: anyone may take a book or contribute one. That's a lot of free books!

In an effort to promote reading and build community right here in Orcutt, some residents have recently installed libraries on their properties.

The addition of the Orcutt libraries falls during the same time the nonprofit is celebrating its 10th anniversary.

Lisa Long, a resident for nearly 30 years, asked her father-in-law, Jim Long, to build her a LFL several years ago after seeing one on Bainbridge Island in Washington.

"I just thought it was a fantastic idea and wanted one ever since," Long explained.

After months of research and planning, he installed it on Woodmere Road May 5. It currently has books for readers of all ages.

"I've always loved books and reading and loved the idea of fostering reading, sharing and community, and thought that where we lived would be a perfect place for one since Woodmere gets a lot of foot traffic," she said.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive. Long started with a few books off her shelf and, after the first day, there were books from others. The next day, there were even more.

She even managed to impress her 6-yearold grandson, Ethan, who picked a book to read. "I'm thrilled with the response so far," she said. "I'm excited to see how it is used in the community, and I'm so glad that it's finally done and being used!"

Nanci Jensen has been running a Little Free Library, built by her husband Greg Pembleton, outside their home on Harsin Ln. for about a year now. Having seen the movement in action when they lived in Seattle, they decided to erect their own library here in Orcutt after neighbors on a nearby street who had one moved away.

The Harsin Ln. Little Free Library is

keeps it in order. "Everybody loves it."

Diane Handlos, the proprietress of the free library on Beverly Dr. echoes Jensen's sentiments. "It's been a huge success," she says. "It has brought a sense of community."

A few years back, Handlos read an article in the LA Times about Little Free Libraries and called up her daughter who, as is turned out, had also read the article – they had the same idea! So after enlisting the help of a friend with carpentry skills to build the library, they held an Open House on their lawn celebrate its opening.

an impressive structure with two rows of books, including novels, picture books, and children's chapter books as well as a guest book where people can make suggestions (Dog Man and Diary of a Wimpy Kid are big favorites).

The books themselves are donated by neighbors or purchased by Jensen. As an unofficial librarian of sorts, she has learned a good deal about her readership and feels that running the library is her contribution to literacy and also a great way to encourage neighbor interactions.

"I was surprised at how much it's used," says Jensen, who checks the library every day and "It's our job to keep it filled," says Handlos. "You just take what you want. It slowly empties, then slowly fills back up again."

Handlos utilizes library book sales and donations to keep her library stocked and loves to see parents sitting on the bench next to her little free library reading to their kids.

There is another LFL on Fountain Dr. Though not affiliated with LFL, a similar library is in front of Harmony Kids' Preschool on Harmony Lane.





Life in Old Orcutt



Fire destroys Orcutt Mercantile in 1959

Through boom times and bad times, there was the Orcutt Mercantile standing tall in a rough-hewn town.

BIG BILL ORCUTT, always modest, was not thrilled to learn that a colleague had named a Union Oil town in his honor. The idea reminded him "of the practice of naming cheap cigars after cheap actresses."

But there was nothing cheap about the town of Orcutt in its earliest years. Oil companies flushed with the success of Old Maud and other discoveries - pumped hundreds of thousands of dollars into equipment, storage tanks, pipeline and supplies to keep the boom booming. Orcutt was the clearinghouse for all this material and the men who would put

it to work in the nearby hills.

At the center of life was the Orcutt Mercantile. It was the only general store for miles. There was a meat. market in town, but the Mercantile was the only place to buy milk and bread, sugar and flour, vegetables and candy. It was also the place to buy feed for the cattle, nails for the barn or clothes for

the kids. Just about anything was sold inside its tin walls. The Mercantile also had the only public hall in town, site of dances and meetings of social clubs. By the 1920s there were a men's store and barbershop on the first floor. Families rented second-floor apartments.

Herman Goodman, whose father was one of Orcutt's earliest barbers, remembered trips to the Mercantile. "You took a list," he said. "You didn't walk down any aisles. You gave them the list, and they filled your order for you. You were waited on. Of course, in those years things were sold in bulk, and they packaged it for you. I used to collect

bottles - big wine bottles - and bring them in. They'd clean those bottles and fill them with vinegar from a big barrel and then sell them back to the public. There was no cash register. You'd put the money in a little box that was attached to a little trolley, and it went up to their office. They'd put in your change and receipt and send it right back."

Running the register was Anita Luis, who with husband Cerfee worked at the Mercantile in the 1920s and 30s and bought the business in 1940. Cerfee Luis was one of nine children who emigrated from the Azores, islands owned by Portugal. His son, Richard, said he "heard a lot of Portuguese spoken in the store. We naturally catered to them." Cerfee told many people that he learned English by reading the labels of cans while stocking the Mercantile's shelves.


"In those days people charged everything... didn't write checks," Richard Luis said. "They'd get their paycheck and come to town and pay their grocery bills - at least we hoped they would. If the bill would get to be \$50 we would get a little concerned because some of them were making only \$50 a month. But that was how the community lived."

There was a family feeling at the Mercantile, too. It had a big potbellied stove surrounded by chairs. "People would come to the store and sit down and talk," Luis said. "It was a big deal to come to the store."

In 1959 - after 48 years at the heart of Orcutt

- the Mercantile burned down. Another Luis boy, Jerry, was working in the store that day. "It was about 1:30 or 2 p.m.," he recalled. "Somebody came into the store and said there was smoke upstairs. I was on the volunteer fire department, so I got the fire truck and sounded the alarm. Then I got busy trying to get stuff out of the store. It was a tin building, and you wouldn't think it would burn. But the fire got inside the walls and spread to the attic. There was no way to get to it to put it out. It burned down in a half hour."

A new building was erected, but the Mercantile - and a chapter in Orcutt history - had closed by the time Cerfee Luis died in




