Planning Commission Says No to Cannabis Delivery Service in Old Orcutt

A cannabis delivery service is unlikely to have a future on East Clark Avenue because it's inconsistent with the community's vision, according to the Santa Barbara County Planning Commissioners.

The Planning Commission met on Aug. 8 to deliberate a permit request for From the Earth to occupy a retail space between Elmer's and Pizzeria Bello Forno.

"I believe that this is going to bring value to the community of Orcutt. I believe that we have a lot to offer this community," said David Moss, chief operating officer of From the Earth.

A major initial concern was the location in relation to a nearby art studio that offers youth instruction.

Beverly Johnson, owner of Beverly Johnson's Studio C in the Orcutt Trade Center, argued that state law prevents cannabis establishments from operating within 600 feet of a school. Johnson, a contractor for Inspire Charter Schools, teaches art classes to three to six children multiple days a week.

"It's a very family-oriented business," she explained.

However, Johnson doesn't have a permit for Studio C. Additionally, whether Johnson's business is legally defined as a school was a factor that left some wondering whether the law applies.

Commission Chair John Parke questioned the relevance of a permit.

"If I have a slaughterhouse in the middle of downtown Santa Maria where I'm slaughtering cattle, would we say it's not a slaughterhouse because you don't have a permit, or would you say it's a slaughterhouse, you just don't happen to have the right permit?" Parke asked. "You have a school or you don't have a school. If it doesn't have the right permit, it's a school without the right permit."

Fifth District Commissioner Daniel Blough focused on the intent of the legislation.

"What I care about is teaching children. The purpose for the prohibition in the state law is so that we don't have children adjacent to marijuana facilities," Blough said.

Dr. Deborah Blow, superintendent of the Orcutt Union School District, echoed similar thoughts regarding the locations impact on local youth. Approximately

1,200 junior high and high school students attend schools nearby and there has been an increase in cannabis use, resulting in more than 22 suspensions in a six-week period, she explained.

"I am very concerned about the potential continued problems with the cannabis distribution center this close to our public schools," she said.

Moss accused some opponents of hypocrisy since Elmer's and Orcutt Liquor are in the same shopping center. State law allows the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to deny a license within 600 feet of schools, but Elmer's and Orcutt Liquor preceded Studio C. Unlike local breweries, wineries and liquor joints, From the Earth would have blackened windows, high security and no public access, he reasoned.

"We have kids going into the liquor store to buy ice cream and right next to it there's a case of beer and wine and Jack Daniel's," Moss said. "How is that any different from what we're proposing here?"

He added that it's a new era and many municipalities in the state have legalized cannabis and benefitted greatly. Other public concerns include odor, limited parking and increased crime. Moss explained there would be no odor and three designated parking spots. Crime may actually decrease because the facility would have armed security, he said.

"We're here to be a part of this community, to contribute to this community—not to destroy this community," he noted.

Ultimately, commissioners plan to deny the project on the basis that the cannabis operation doesn't align with the Orcutt Community Plan adopted in 1997, which prepares for growth and development in the unincorporated area. The space should be reserved for retail that generates foot traffic, they each noted, making a non-storefront retailer a poor match for the location.

"I think we've got the right guy at the right time in the wrong place," said Commissioner Larry Ferini who represents the Fourth District including Orcutt.

Orcutt's Campus Connection Welcomes New Director

The Campus Connection program, which operates in partnership with the Orcutt Union School District, has provided child care services for thousands of children since its inception in 1992. Though the kids come and go, the staff often stay for years and even decades, a testament to the program itself as well as the District.

Pam English began working in the Campus Connection office thirteen years ago. Orcutt History

Eureka! Old Maud's Gusher Puts Orcutt on the Map

Not long after Orcutt was established, an event occurred that marked an era of rapid advancement for the oil industry in general and the Union Oil Company and the town of Orcutt in particular. On December 2, 1904, Hartnell No.1, the first producing well on Hartnell property, came in with such force that it became one of the great wonders of California. The tremendous excitement that Old Maud, as the well was named, created is captured in a description of the event by Jack Reed, a member of the crew that brought the gusher in:

"Then with a roar, a column of oil and gas shoots up through the rid floor to a height of 150 feet. Oil begins pouring down the gullies and creek beds. We have the biggest producer the world. We can't control it, what with 12,000 barrels of oil everyday. We don't even have tanks or pipelines big enough to handle the flow, so we scrape up a series of earth dams. Pools of crude collect for miles below as the flow continues day after day for three months."

Frank Hill, who was superintendent on the job and later Director of Production for Union Oil, added that:

"By mistake, one of the workmen closed a valve ... This completely shuts in the well which is under great gas pressure. This starts the oil flowing through the formations, and for hundreds of yards around every gopher hole begins to spout oil. The surrounding of fields are full of miniature geysers of oil."

Fortunately, the valve was reopened and the oil started gushing through the casing. The well produced one million its first 100 days. It flowed for over two years and yielded nearly three million barrels before being put on the pump. Thereafter, Old Maud produced 250 barrels a day until 1918, when the casing collapsed and the well was shut-in. The well

was reopened in 1943 to help meet the great wartime demand for oil and, at that time, it produced 175 barrels a day. Old Maud is now abandoned, a relic located in the quiet canyon amidst other remains of turn-of-the-century oil operations. The canyon itself shows no apparent signs of the flood of crude that once inundated it, and much of the land that was covered with oil is now cattle grazed.

Old Maud's spectacular behavior not only opened up the Santa Maria Oil Field to intensive development, it precipitated a boom in oil stocks. It gave financial backers confidence in oil drilling as a profitable and legitimate industry, and gave Union Oil status as a major oil company. Old Maud further accelerated Orcutt's development. For the next few years the town grew rapidly. Even when the Cat Canyon oil fields were discovered in 1909 and some oil workers and operations were drawn to the eastern part of the Santa Maria Valley, the town of Orcutt did not cease to grow. Its pace of development slowed, but improvements were still made.

The 2019-2020 school year in the Orcutt Union School District began with lots of smiles, and a new look for some of our campuses.






