School District Partners with TAIT & Associates to Bridge Generational Gap



Developer TAIT & Associates will break ground on a brand new 233 unit senior living facility in Old Town Orcutt before August 2022, with phase one of the project scheduled to be completed sometime between June 2023 and April 2024. The facility will provide multiple levels of care for residents, workforce housing, a preschool and daycare facility, and a playground adjacent to an existing park.

Approximately eighteen percent

of Orcutt's roughly 29,000 person population is 65 or older. Seniors over the age of 65 make up 14.9 percent of Santa Barbara County's population, which numbers more than 448,000 people.

The 9.53-acre lot on Soares Ave. is between Dyer Sreet and South First Street. It lies two blocks south of Orcutt's downtown area, with schools, parks, a library, shopping, and fine dining all within a one-mile radius.

The Orcutt Union School District

acquired Key Site 17 in 2001 and initially planned it as a primary grade level school site. However, due to declining enrollment, the District conducted an asset management plan in 2006, focusing on utilizing vacant or underutilized district properties to generate revenue for future needs.

After May 2007, the District convened a 7-11 committee, which, after studying several options for the use of the parcel, recommended to the board of trustees that it pursue a ground lease to develop the parcel for use as senior housing. TAIT & Associates received Board approval to act as a lease agent in December 2019.

The project will bridge intergenerational learning environments for both students and senior citizens. According to Bill Young, OUSD Assistant Superintendent of Business Services, the vision may include junior high or high school career technical training, student work experience, internships, and opportunities for seniors to volunteer at OUSD schools.

Young says the District selected TAIT because it presented a concept that compliments Old Orcutt in design and function.

In a District press release, Trevor Tait (TAIT & Associates) said, "We are absolutely thrilled to have been selected by Orcutt Union School District to develop Key Site 17. Our goal is simple - to develop a project that will be cherished by the District and the entire community of Orcutt for generations to come. At every point in this journey, our team has been inspired by the mission of Orcutt Union School District. In addition to creating a vibrant and dynamic senior community, our project will seek to nurture, educate, empower, and inspire children of Orcutt Union School District."

A virtual walkthrough of the conceptual design is available online at orcuttschools.net. The architect's rendering of the site has yet to be approved. A final draft of the plans is still to come.

Military Parade Warms Heart of 100-Year-Old Marine



Arnold McLean, Marine hero of World War II, prisoner of war and survivor of the Bataan Death March, was celebrated with a horn-honking military parade in Orcutt on July 11th.

McLean, in a wheelchair, sat near his house wearing a marine cap, red shirt, American flag mask with a sword in his lap. The parade included local police and sheriffs, with lights and sirens, paramedics, motorcycles, fire engines, honking cars, trucks, and vans of all sizes, including antiques. Some had kids with flags hanging out the back and through the windows. McLean, surprised by the fuss, raised a small

flag as over 100 vehicles drove by.

He shouldn't be surprised, explains Armando Moreno, of the local chapter of the Marine Corps League detachment 1340, "he's a national treasure, a jewel." Moreno learned of McLean and contacted Welcome Home Heroes, a group based in the five cities area that supports veterans. Together they organized this event to honor McLean.

McLean, a young Marine with only a few weeks training, shipped out from San Diego to the Philippines in 1939. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, on December 7, 1941, the Japanese focused on taking the Philippines, with especially intense fighting in Bataan

from January 7, 1942, to the day McLean and 76,00 others surrendered on April 9, 1942. He and the other prisoners of war were ruthlessly marched approximately 65 miles with no food, water or sleep. Casualties of the march were at least 5,000 and some reports put the death toll as high as 18,000. The Baatan Death March was deemed a war crime by the Allied Military Commission after the war was over.

"We marched for ten days," McLean recalled and "if someone fell over they were bayonetted and killed. At one point a Japanese battalion marched by us (the other direction) swinging their swords and heads

and arms were cut off."

Asked how he survived McLean said, "I took each day as it came and the hell with tomorrow. Let tomorrow take care of itself. I never gave up and the ones that did aren't

After the death march, prisoners were put on trains and eventually on ships to Japan to be used as slave labor until the war ended. "We were taken on transport ships to Nagasaki, ten ships were in the convoy and eight were lost. I was on one of the two that made it." Allied Forces had destroyed the other eight, not knowing of the prisoners on board.

Eventually McLean was taken to northern Japan where he worked in copper mines. The men would be lowered into the mines while jammed into ore cars with a single bar keeping them from falling off the sides. "Everyone would be hanging on to each other and if one fell off, everyone would go." They worked seven days a week, says McLean and got one scoop of rice, six ounces, as a whole day's food. "We got a half a scoop if we stayed in camp and if we were sick we got nothing." The men got up at 4AM every morning and had to sing the Japanese national anthem. "I still know it," he said as he sang it out loud.

"I was able to get one letter a month and it could only be twenty-five words," says McLean, pointing to one of the letters from his mother.

It was cold in the prison camp and they each received two blankets except when the Geneva Red Cross would come and inspect. Then the prisoners would be given better clothes and two extra blankets and were told to say "good" when asked how the treatment was. "A guard watched and if you didn't say good you got beat to the ground after the inspectors left."

McLean went into the war weighing 200 and left weighing 77 pounds. He spent two years recovering in a hospital. He had no teeth, a bar in his arm, a shattered shoulder, two shattered knees and a nose broken so many times he lost count. Shot twice, he was awarded two purple hearts among other medals.

After the war McLean worked twenty-five years for Boeing, survived three wives, had four kids and enjoyed much traveling. One of the purple hearts is buried with his dog. I put a gown on him and pinned it to the gown. Someday someone in Lompoc will dig up some little bones and a purple heart," he said with a smile. "I really love that dog."

Mr. McLean, we really love you, and thank



Orcutt Schools Update

Distance Learning Through the Eyes of a Student

You probably have heard about the Orcutt Union School District and other school districts around the country implementing something called "distance learning" while campuses are closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. To help our community better understand what we are doing, this column will detail how a typical week of distance learning is experienced by one of our students.

Let's say you are a fourth grader. Distance learning has you working at home in a dedicated "school space" of your choosing, whether that is your kitchen table or a desk – just so you have enough space to arrange your textbooks, school supplies, and Chromebook that the district has provided you.

Your week begins on Monday morning with a Zoom online meeting with your classroom teacher and all of the other students in your class. The teacher goes over the work for the week and conducts a lesson that addresses a social/ emotional topic such as reducing stress or connecting with friends.

You have been assigned to Cohort A, which participates in live instruction from your classroom teacher on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. (Each TK-6 class is divided into two cohorts so teachers can work with smaller groups at one time.) What this means is that the teacher will conduct an online Zoom meeting with you for 30-45 minutes at a time, after which you are asked to work independently out of your textbooks with the teacher available to answer questions if needed. This cycle - teacher Zoom and student work - continues through the morning.

The Zoom meetings you attend have another purpose, as you are able to see and socialize with other students. After your teacher confers with the whole class via Zoom, she sometimes will set up breakout sessions where you can catch up with classmates and discuss the academic

On Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, you have time to work on assignments on your own. If you have questions, you can send them to your teacher by email or in the stream of the Google Classroom your teacher has set up for your class.

Wednesday and Friday mornings are times for your teacher to meet by Zoom with the other cohort while your cohort has live or prerecorded lessons from teachers in physical education and music. Once a week you also can click on a link to a prerecorded Arts Attack lesson that directs you in creating a piece of original visual art such as a portrait using colored pencils supplied by the district.

Wednesday and Friday afternoons, you see your classroom teacher again. Depending on what she has assigned, the teacher can present another lesson, guide our group through an ongoing project, offer individualized feedback, or tutor students who are struggling with an assignment.

As readers will see from this description of a week in the life of a fourth grader, distance learning is a diverse, engaging program that has students participating in lessons taught by teachers, working out of textbooks, interacting with peers, even doing P.E. and the arts. Access to virtual Zoom meetings and other online applications is important, but students most certainly are not being asked to be in front of a computer screen for hours on end.

Everyone will agree that distance learning cannot equal the magic of inperson instruction, with teachers working directly and personally with students. But we in the Orcutt Union School District have worked to make distance learning as productive and enjoyable for students as we can.

"Our teachers have been working tirelessly to provide a wonderful education for our students in whatever setting is put before them," says Janet Bertoldi, the district's interim assistant superintendent of educational services. "We feel good about the distance learning program we have in place and are ready to put it in motion."
