Cannabis Chain "Cookies805" Wins Quest to Apply for Dispensary Permit

Appeals filed by two applicants delay final decision

Santa Barbara County has released rankings for a cannabis dispensary in Orcutt. After several months of reviewing applications and requesting applicants submit business and neighborhood compatibility documents, East ClarkSB, doing business as Cookies, topped the other four applicants and will have the opportunity to apply for a permit to dispense cannabis. Only one dispensary will be allowed in Orcutt.

However, two of the five Orcutt applicants vying for the right to apply for the permit have filed appeals contesting the County process for the prioritizing of the applicants. The final rankings, with Cookies805 currently at the top, will not be released until appeals are resolved. Brittany Heaton with the County Executive Office says she hopes the final list can be released by months end.

Filing an appeal was the second ranked applicant, Strategic Golden, doing business as Unique Farms, which hopes to open a cannabis dispensary at 155 East Clark Ave in Old Town Orcutt. The other appeal was filed by SLO Cultivation, doing business as Sunnyside, ranked fifth in the scoring, vying to dispense cannabis at 3550 Orcutt Road, building C4 behind

Spencer's Fresh Markets.

If the permit is approved, the now vacant building at 1604 East Clark, Building B, Suite 1 will house the dispensary. Also in that shopping center are Verizon, Cottage Urgent Care and Nail Beauty Salon.

The Cookies chain of dispensaries also has a storefront on Ocean Avenue in Lompoc.

Initially there were six applicants. However, the number went to five when Natural Healing Center (NHC) did not score high enough in business operations and neighborhood compatibility reviews. A judge in late July ruled in favor of the

County's evaluation process and denied NHC's petition. Natural Healing Center purchased Old Town Market last fall in hopes of operating a dispensary in Old Town Orcutt, but its founder, Helios Dayspring, recently pled guilty to bribing late San Luis Obispo County Supervisor Adam Hill to vote in favor of his cannabis operations in that County. Dayspring was also charged with subscribing to a false income tax return and failing to report millions of dollars of income to the IRS, according to the US Department of Justice.

Rancho Maria Golf Club and Orcutt Ranch LLC now Working Together for a Housing Project at the Golf Course

After initially strenuously opposing the proposal for 129 homes among the fairways at Rancho Maria Golf Course, the owners of the Club have agreed to work with the developer to put together housing development acceptable to golf course owners and Orcutt Ranch LLC, the developer.

Cheryl O'Keefe Severn, president of the Rancho Maria Golf Club (RMGC) board told the Planning Commissioners August 11th that the owners are "happy and excited to work together with all parties to put together an

The owners have adamantly opposed the project but agreed several weeks ago to allow a "Chief Development Officer" to be hired to help reach an agreement. In a letter to the County August 9th, Francis Romero, representing the developer, said there have been "promising meetings and we have embarked on a collaborative effort with RMGC to identify a plan that addresses the interaction of housing with the golf course and we feel we are making progress."

Romero said all sides hoped an acceptable project could come before the Planning Commission by next summer.

Fifth District Commissioner Dan Blough said he preferred getting conceptual plans before the Commission in December or January. He felt next summer, county planning staff may not like the project and request all sides start over again. "I want to avoid that," he said.

But Severn said her team has not discussed

county input during this process and would feel "uncomfortable" presenting conceptual plans without discussing the proposal with the RMGC board. "We are interested in an indefinite process. We need a date to consider before we commit coming back to the Commission."

Commissioner John Parke of the Third District made the motion to drop the item from the agenda and not set a continuance date. The motion carried 5-0.



Planning Commission Delays Gas Station Project

Traffic and undergrounding utilities were the center of the discussion on July 28th as the Santa Barbara County Planning Commission considered plans for a gas station at the intersection of Lakeview and the Orcutt Expressway. The proposed station and convenience store would be on the southeast corner of the Orcutt Road

and Lakeview Road intersection.

Traffic at that intersection has been a bugaboo for the county for decades. Chairman Larry Ferini, who represents the Fourth District said, "traffic seems to be our biggest issue." Fifth District Commissioner Dan Blough, who lives

close to the intersection, was even more emphatic. "It's the worst intersection I know in the entire county. It's terrible."

The latest county approach is to limit north and southbound vehicles to right turns only onto Lakeview Road from Orcutt Road during peak hours. Two signs will be highly visible from the north and southbound approaches on Orcutt Road.

"That intersection has no best solution," Transportation Planning Supervisor Will Robertson told the commission. "I have been with the county for twenty years and every time we come up with a solution, more traffic problems develop." He says the traffic signs are a baby step. "I feel pretty confident it will work."

Complicating the issue is that the intersection is governed by three jurisdictions: the county, CalTrans, and the City of Santa Maria.

Commissioners Ferini and Blough said they would be contacting County continued on page 3

Prepping is key to a long lasting paint project. Invest in a orbital palm sander for sanding the woodwork. Let the sander do all the hard work with different grit sandpaper. On exterior fascia and trim woodwork, 60 or 80 grit sandpaper can get much of the hard work done in no time. Finish with a 100 grit to smooth out rough areas created by the coarse paper. On finer woodwork such as doors and cabinets start with a 100 grit then finish with a 150 or 220 grit sandpaper. Whenever woodwork is exposed, prime before painting.

Supervisors Bob Nelson of the Fourth District and Steve Lavagnino of the Fifth District regarding the matter.

The site was previously the home to a gas station until the late 1990's. Under the current proposal, the site would include a 5100 square foot building, four fuel dispensers and a convenience store. Third District Commissioner John Parke also suggested charger stations for electric vehicles.

Planners also recommended that the county waive the requirement that the applicant underground the utilities to that corner. However, the commission directed staff to review the costs of undergrounding the two poles on the Lakeview side and install a pole across the intersection on the median between the Expressway and Orcutt Road.

The matter was continued until the October 6 meeting.

WWII Veteran, Dan Daniels: 100 Years Old and Still Singing

Seated outside his attractive home in Orcutt surrounded by his beloved fruit trees, plum and lemon (for home-made lemon meringue pies!), Lt. Colonel Lloyd (Dan) E. Daniels, Retired US Army Air

has been an active participant in life for over a century. "I'm in my 101st year, he says unabashedly, with a winning smile. This centurion and greatgreat grandfather has an extensive list of accomplishments spanning 28 years of military service and many, many more in singing and performing barbershop.

Dan was born in 1921, who, along with

his three brothers, sang as a quartet at church meetings. His love for vocal harmony stayed with him throughout his military career and is part of Dan's overall attitude for life. "You've got to be active

Corps and US Air Force mentally and physically and stay involved," he says.

> Drafted into the U.S. Army in August 1941, Daniels went to basic training at Camp Upton, Long Island, NY, not far from where he was born in Cropseyville, NY. "Now it's not so small but back then Cropseyville had around 50 people, said Dan.

> Those small-town beginnings did not stop him from doing big things. He first landed in Kentucky in the infantry for 6 months but later moved on to earn his pilot's wings in 1943. When the war ended, he went on to master the rigors of Aeronautical Engineering Wind tunnel design at Georgia Tech. He flew the famed B-17 flying fortress and was an instructor during and after the war in the Korean conflict from 1954-1955.

> His favorite assignment though was at Wright Patterson AFB in Dayton, Ohio, where in 1951, he was chief of the

Supersonic Wind Tunnel. "The research part was the most interesting", he said, then added he wrote papers for the NACA (National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics) before it became NASA. He jokingly commented, "When we played handball with the Astronauts we won."

Dan reflected on his long-time passion for music. "I've been singing since age 4 and with the barber shoppers for 33 years. I've practiced with 3 international barbershop groups before they went into competition," he said. The 1962 international champions, the Sidewinders, let Dan "sit in" when they were rehearsing. Another great memory for Dan is traveling with the AHC chorale under the direction of Glenn Montague to Poland in 1987.

At 100 years young, Dan continues to sing and enjoy family, friends and wonderful memories of his long and active life!

Dream Cross Country Trip in Classic Model A Fords

Just over a year ago, knowing they were taking their vintage Model A Fords on a National Ford Model A tour of northeast states, eight members in the Santa Maria Model A Ford Club pondered the question; "Why not drive Model As back to our homes on the Central Coast? We could drive most of the way on historic Route 66".

So began the planning of the cross-country odyssey by Jay McCord, president of the Model A Club of Santa Maria and his wife Kay, Brian and Roberta Weber, Ed and Kathy Pedrick of Orcutt, and Bill and Laura Hansen of Lompoc.

The three classic vehicles that made the 15-day journey are all original; McCord has restored a 1930 Model A Ford coupe, Weber a 1931 Victoria, a prelude to the current Crown Victoria, while Bill and Laura Hansen were in their 1930 2-door sedan.

In late June the entourage flew to Milton, New Hampshire, with their vintage cars in shipment, where they enjoyed four days touring the Northeast with about 400 members of the National Model A Ford Club.

McCord, Weber, and the Hansens began their excursion across America.

McCord says many little towns looked like Orcutt. "Especially over Independence Day. So patriotic, flags waving, fireworks. We saw scores of murals depicting the history of Route 66. I was so impressed with the patriotism in each little town we passed through."

The four stopped in Cooperstown, New

York, and toured the National Baseball Hall of Fame and in Dearborn, Michigan, saw the Henry Ford Museum then headed for downtown Chicago and the starting point of Route 66.

From Chicago they traveled from 250 to 300 miles per day averaging from 35 to 55 miles per hour through Missouri, down to Oklahoma City, across Texas to Tucumcari, New Mexico.

McCord says the Blue Swallow Motel in Tucumcari was a highlight. The hotel had been built in 1939, had been completely restored, and is in continuous operation.

The four drivers passed through Flagstaff, Arizona, and to what McCord says was a fun little town in the Black Mountains of Mohave County called Oatman, Arizona, which began as a small mining town in 1915 when a couple of miners struck a \$10 million dollar gold find. The town was flooded with gold diggers but was nearly abandoned in the 1940s. However, the donkeys used in the mines remained and thrived and still can be seen roaming throughout the little town.

The quartet in the three Model A Fords then passed through the desert town of Needles, California, where the temperature hit 122 degrees. Asked

about air conditioning, McCord says all we had was "two by 55... or windows down at 55 miles per hour. It got pretty hot sometimes."

On the last day of the trip we drove 444 miles. "We were ready for home," he chuckles.

On arriving at the pier in Santa Monica, California, the terminus of Route 66 on July 10th, they drove on bikeways toward the end of the pier. "When nobody was looking, we drove right up to the "End of Trail" sign and took pictures."

The four drivers and their classic vehicles then wound their way home to Orcutt on Highway 1.

McCord is very reminiscent of the history of Route 66. In 1933, his mother rode the Greyhound bus from Oklahoma City to Los Angeles. Earlier his dad journeyed on the famed highway to Los Angeles.

"We need to remember, so many of our ancestors have traveled on this historic highway often called 'The Mother Road'. Before the interstate system was built in the 1950's, this was the very best way to travel west across America."

Orcutt Schools Update

Inspiring Start to New School Year

Lakeview Junior High School Principal Jonathan Dollahite smiled as he gazed out at his student body at nutrition break on the first day of school. "It's just nice to see everyone back together," he commented to a visitor.

Back together indeed does describe how Orcutt Union School District schools opened the 2021-2022 school year on August 13. For the first time since before the COVID-19 pandemic, our campuses opened their doors for full-time, in-person instruction.

"I would liken our first day of school to your wedding day when you smile for so many pictures that your cheeks hurt," says Jared Banks, new principal at Olga Reed School and Orcutt Academy K-8 in Los Alamos. "I just couldn't stop smiling. It was magical to see school working again."

Banks is one of three new school principals in our district this year. He is joined by Nikki Sorensen, principal at Patterson Road School, and Josh Ostini, who is the new principal of Orcutt Independent Study while also serving as vice-principal at Orcutt Academy High School. Molly Johnston joins our administrative team as vice-principal at Joe Nightingale School and Orcutt Junior High School.

As for classroom instruction, the district's signature project of 2021-2022 is full-day kindergarten, as all of the district's K classes will transition to a daily schedule equal to that of the other elementary grades. A longer school day affords teachers more time to build a strong foundation of reading, writing, and mathematical skills while giving students more time for socialization and developmental activities. Research shows that full-day K results in higher long-term academic achievement for students.

In support of full-day kindergarten, Orcutt has hired 16 instructional assistants to support students in K classrooms around the district. These paraprofessionals will work with students individually and in small groups, help with student supervision at recess and lunch, and handle sundry other tasks that are of assistance to kindergartners.

The instructional assistants are among approximately 50 new employees hired for the new school year. This number includes new administrators, new classified employees, new teachers, and new counselors. Kudos to Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources Susan Salucci and her department for their diligence in recruiting quality new staff for Orcutt.

"I am super excited about the level of talent that we have brought on to complement our already-wonderful staff," says Salucci. "This is a great thing for kids."

We conclude with mention of one of the district's more unconventional efforts this school year: launching an eSports program at Orcutt Academy High School. eSports are organized computer and/or console games played in much the same way as regular athletic events; in fact, eSports have become an official sport sanctioned by the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF). This is a compelling endeavor for students who enjoy computer gaming, and 44 OAHS students responded to an initial inquiry.

"I'm excited about the potential this has to lead students to future opportunities in eSports careers," says Leslie Wagonseller, the district's executive director of technology and educational services. "But I'm even more excited about what it brings to the table for kids. eSports are fun!"

Here's hoping that the 2021-2022 school year brings plenty of smiles, learning, and fun to the students of the Orcutt Union School District!

Sons of the American Legion Rocks Orcutt with Concert Series




Jerold R. Luis


