Santa Maria Public Airport On Lookout for Commercial Service



Central Coast AirFest will host a radio-controlled aircraft for the first time on Oct. 12 and 13.

2nd Annual AirFest Oct. 12-13

Despite concerns that the Santa Maria Public Airport hasn't added a new airline service, recent announcements from a neighboring airport will benefit the search, according to General Manager Chris Hastert.

"Although it seems counterintuitive, this is actually a good sign for future flights from Santa Maria," he explained.

In the past two months, San Luis Obispo County Regional Airport (SBP) officials revealed the addition of direct flights to San Diego, Las Vegas and Portland. Santa Maria Airport staff, on the other hand, have been working towards adding a new service since Mokulele Airlines stopped flights in 2017. Since then, Allegiant Air has offered the only commercial flights, taking passengers to Las Vegas.

"For Santa Maria to succeed in adding service with one of the major carriers, both of our neighbors need to be doing very well with their air service," he said. "The good news is they are, and it has generated more interest in Santa Maria from a couple of those carriers."

The Santa Maria Public Airport District's board of directors met on Aug. 8 to discuss the ongoing effort. During the meeting, a presentation was given that noted the

airport's strengths and challenges.

Strengths include its central location, local tourism, usage by Vandenberg Air Force Base, and that Santa Maria is the fastest growing city on the Central Coast. Additionally, the airport has superior facilities with the runway at 8,000 feet — the longest on the California Coast between the Los Angeles International Airport and the San Jose International Airport — and is managed by a special district.

There are two core challenges, the first being its proximity to SBP and the Santa Barbara Municipal Airport (SBA).

"The natural method of airlines adding flights to the Central Coast usually begins with Santa Barbara, capitalizing on their strong reputation as a tourist destination, county seat and state university," Hastert said.

When the airlines seek to add more service to the area, he continued, they typically skip Santa Maria for SBP in hopes that they don't pull passengers away from SBA. Many of the big airlines already feel they're adequately serving the Central Coast with service at SBP and SBA.

The other challenge is that new airlines look to service airports with the highest historical passenger demand.

The presentation also revealed that nonstop



service beyond 1,000 miles is unlikely because of the higher cost of fuel and crew, larger aircraft and need for higher passenger demand.

Arguably the biggest takeaway from the presentation was that it disclosed the results of recent meetings with various airlines. Some destinations being explored are Denver, Seattle, Portland, Phoenix, San Diego, Dallas, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Based on the notes, Denver and Phoenix are strong prospects. Flights from SBP and SBA to Denver are doing well — with load rates of more than 85 percent — which could support additional service in Santa Maria. Denver also has military ties. Phoenix loads are average, but American Airlines is pleased with the overall performance and said a route from Santa Maria is "just a matter of time."

Additionally, Santa Maria is on the shortlist for service to Phoenix through Allegiant.

Airport officials are continuing to meet one-on-one with airlines. In October, a meeting with United Airlines will be held. United could offer service to Denver, Los Angeles or San Francisco. United provided service to Los Angeles until 2015, then switched to San Francisco until 2016 when flights were pulled due to high rates and underperformance. However, all markets are now contract-based which should improve any future fares.

October will also bring the second annual Central Coast Airfest, featuring new performances from the United States Air Force F-16 Viper Demo Team and Robert Holland, a record-breaking aerobatic pilot, on Oct. 12 and 13 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

It's an event that exposes the community to a different side of aviation, helps local businesses, and collects proceeds for volunteers that help with the event, aviation scholarships and more.

"First and foremost, it allows the community access to the airport to experience the excitement of aviation and potential career opportunities," Hastert said. "In these days of strict security measures related to air travel, it is difficult to get up close to aircraft, pilots and businesses located on the airport."

Walking America, and Through Orcutt, for Cancer Research "We did not know Tom prior to him knocking on our door, but we opened our

home to him," says Joe Waltuch of Thomas Curran, the 50 year old Californian walking across the country in support of children's cancer research.

After seven months on the road, Curran found himself passing through our neck of the woods and, through a series of friends and relations networking, spent a night with the Joe and Pam Waltuch right here in Orcutt.

"He's a very nice person, very knowledgeable, and we are glad we were able to spend some time with him," says Joe.

A visit to Thomas Curran's website, MovingOnWest.com begins like this: "Dear family and friend, old and new, grab a glass of wine or coffee and have a seat." Tom has a story to tell and he wants to take us all along with him.

"I've been a chef for 25 years," he wrote. "I love cooking, I love opening restaurants, I love seeing happy faces, I love the community and everything that comes with the grueling lifestyle of a chef."

So how does a chef become a cross-country walker? After opening a little taqueria and sausage joint called Taco Brat in Costa Mesa, Curran and his business partner parted ways. "It's been one hell of a long,

wonderful few years for me both personally and professionally," he explained. "[But] Taco Brat and the lifestyle/financial impact it had on me became overwhelming."

Curran said going through this process had him questioning what was really important to him in life. "Call it my Fight Club moment. 'The things you own end up owning you'. And that's how I've lived my life... always trying to get ahead and not quite getting there and feeling stressed and disappointed. I know that I cannot move forward like that and be healthy. I need a deep soul cleanse. I need a big change and I want that change to mean something to other people than just me. I have never allowed myself the space or time to find my spiritual path."

After reading several books by others who had walked across America, Curran realized that they all had one thing in common: their Why. "Whether to explore the country, find their soul, figure out their life, or for philanthropic reasons, they had a purpose that motivated them to get up, fold up their tent, and get walking. Without the 'Why', they never would have made it."

Curran certainly had the desire and the determination for such a feat. "As I was thinking about getting the hell out of here, before I started thinking about this walk,

I always pictured myself running off to Europe," he wrote. "But then I realized that I don't even know my own country, so perhaps the best place to start this journey is right here in America. I want to meet the people of this country, I want to see the small towns, I want to sit on a stranger's porch and drink root beer and make a new friend, I want to be scared out of my mind because I think there's a bear outside my tent, I want to brave the Rocky Mountains with my cart and sing when I get to the top and know it's all (mostly)

Crash Survivor Facing Road Ahead with Determination | Walking

A 23-year-old Orcutt native who suffered major injuries after a single-car rollover in June is making strides, but could use the community's help as she continues on her road to recovery.

Chelsee Fuerch was the passenger in a 1998 Toyota Corolla when the driver, Sienna Diaz-Tremper, drifted onto the right shoulder of Figueroa Mountain Road near the Chamberlin Ranch in Los Olivos. According to the California Highway Patrol, Diaz-Tremper overcorrected and caused the vehicle to spin, travel down an embankment and roll over. Fuerch was airlifted to Santa Barbara Cottage Hospital and Diaz-Tremper, 21, died at the scene.

Fuerch suffered spinal cord injuries leading to quadriplegia. She's had to relearn things that come naturally to most — how to breathe, speak and laugh. Though she has no hand or finger movement, she's improved her arm control and has been learning how to use devices with the limited movement she has at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center.

She describes her life over the past few

months as a roller coaster ride. In early May, Fuerch and her family lost their home in Orcutt after 15 years. On May 18, she graduated from California State University, Channel Islands. On June 18, the accident happened, permanently altering her life.

After graduation, Fuerch planned to work and enjoy her newly

stress-free life, according to Rachel Ross, her best friend of more than 10 years. The two graduated with each other and found comfort in the fact that "they would be continuing into the unknown together." Fuerch loved the outdoors - hiking, beach trips and exploring — and above all, to dance, Ross said.

"Everything's changed," Fuerch explained. "Breathing, coughing, laughing, going to the bathroom, walking, what I think of myself, how I feel about myself, my family, my friends. Literally everything."

With the changes, Feurch's goals shifted. Since every day is still a challenge and roundthe-clock care is a necessity, her ultimate wish is to become as independent as possible. Physically, she hopes to gain wrist and tricep movement, which would increase her abilities tremendously. Medical staff said the first year is when she'll make the most progress, according to her cousin Christy Reasner. She's scheduled to return to Orcutt at the end of September, where the struggles will continue.

"I'm terrified to go home," she explained.

"All the change that's going to come adapting to being in my hometown as a quadriplegic — is going to be overwhelming."

"She's still looking forward to the future, just knows it's going to be different," Reasner

Fuerch will temporarily reside with her aunt as she and other family members have yet to find a home to rent in Orcutt. Members will take turns providing 24-hour care, some considering job changes.

"We're hoping to coordinate as a team because it really is a team effort," Reasner said. Reasner created a GoFundMe to raise money for Fuerch's ongoing needs with a goal of \$50,000. As of press time, nearly \$14,000 had been donated.

"People have been so generous and kind, it's just amazing," Reasner said. "It renews our hope in mankind."

The idea is to do everything possible to make things easier for Fuerch. She is seeking items such as a manual wheelchair, a van for transport and an Apple Watch to communicate and connect with the world.

Many of her needs are still undetermined, according to Ross' mom, Michelle Graham.

"Her needs are beyond anything we could imagine," Graham said. "She needs so many new resources to help her gain some freedom and basic life necessities."

Fuerch and her family want to express the importance of safe driving and making good choices. Eventually, Fuerch hopes to share the message at local schools.

downhill to home."

If this desire for connection wasn't enough of a Why, Curran decided to devote his walk to the Pediatric Cancer Research Foundation, a cause near and dear to his family, as his ex-wife is a childhood cancer survivor. The PCRF has raised over \$42 million for cancer research since 1982 and funds thirteen institutions across the country.

Curran embarked on his mission on February 2nd after visiting his son Holden, and began his walk in Holden Beach, North Carolina. From there he walked through cities in Tennessee, Kansas, and Oklahoma with his dog Wink before taking his pup home to California, going back to OK, and continuing the rest of the journey alone, departing from his originally planned route to walk through Idaho and Oregon and down through California.


On September 3rd he stayed in Orcutt, continuing on to Lompoc on September 4th. As of press time, Curran was in Marina de Rey, only a short 50 miles from his endpoint at Newport Beach Pier.

The eighth annual Orcutt Children's Arts Foundation (OCAF) Chalk Festival on Saturday, September 28, will be nothing short of a community celebration of the arts. The Festival will take place from 10:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on South Broadway in Old Orcutt. Everyone is invited to attend.

"This year's theme is 'Feast on the Arts' because we wanted to highlight that everything we do in life has an artistic flair," says event chair and OCAF volunteer Rick Corbo. "We will have so many artists there. Plus, in Old Orcutt we have lots of culinary artists, and we wanted to include

As in past years, visitors to the Chalk Festival will be able to eavesdrop on skilled artists as they outline and color in chalk pictures and murals on sidewalks and blacktop. Over 50 amateur and emerging artists have committed to participate. Meanwhile, featured artists Ever Galvez and Ruben Espinoza will be doing paintings that they will donate back to OCAF for the foundation's annual Gala fund-raiser in February.

Kids can try their hands at chalk artistry, too. For \$10, children receive a box of professional pastel chalk and a street square to produce their own masterpiece. Children also can drop by a

Kids' Corner with activities focused on science, recycling, and the arts.

The Festival's entertainment includes singing, dancing, and instrumental music. The lineup is as follows: 10:30 a.m., Garcia Dance Studio; 11:15, Noon Bender and Jack; 12:15 p.m., Beyond the Vessel and Me; 1:15, Milania Espinoza; 2:15, Orcutt Junior High School Ukelele Band; 2:30, Champion McConnell. Between performances four different flash mobs will build from those in the audience.

Culinary arts are included, and six food trucks will be parked on the Old Orcutt roadway to vend their own edible creations. And throughout the streets numerous artisans, organizations, and merchants will welcome passerby at booths and "There's something for everyone," says Lee Ann Luongo, OCAF's executive director.

Proceeds from the event will support OCAF's efforts to fund arts education in Orcutt Union School District classrooms.

Corbo, who been involved with the Festival from its inception, values how the event engages families in the arts. He and his wife Ruth have three children and have hosted 14 foreign exchange students whom he calls "my 14 other kids." He encourages families near and far to make the effort to visit Old Orcutt on September 28.

"This Chalk Festival will be an event of the synergy of the arts," he says. "I mean that literally because it's all of the arts coming together: performance arts, visual arts, culinary arts, and arts vendors. It's going to be cool."

"We have a strong following of Riptide groupies who swing dance all over the Central Coast," says Bailey.



Imagine taking a walk through town when suddenly a squadron of fighter pilots passes overhead. In 1943, a P-38 in the skies over Santa Marla was fairly common. We were home to the Santa Maria Army Air Base, one of the largest training bases on the west coast.

The P-38 was one of the premier fighting aircraft of World War II, designed to fly as high as bombers and with the same range. Used in both theaters, many a bomber pilot saw his chances of returning to base significantly increased when escorted by one of these powerful aircraft. And many of those pilots were trained right here in Santa Maria.


