

Planning Commission Recommends Approval of New OASIS Center



At its meeting on September 11, the Santa Barbara County Planning Commission voted 4-1, to recommend that the Board of Supervisors approve the application of OASIS Senior Center to amend the Orcutt Community Plan (OCP) to allow development of a portion of Key Site 18, which is located in the Orcutt Creek area between Old Town Orcutt and Southpoint Estates. First District Commissioner Michael Cooney was the dissenting vote.

Orcutt Area Seniors in Service (OASIS) would like to build a permanent facility on a 5.2 acre parcel that was donated by locals Steve and Debbie LeBard. OASIS is currently located in Old Orcutt next to the Orcutt Union School District offices on land and in modular buildings leased

to it by the school district. The school district is planning to lease the 9.53 acre parcel it owns to TAIT & Associates to develop for use as senior housing. The development will necessitate that OASIS relocate.

Key Site 18 was originally dedicated as open space acreage as part of the Southpoint Estates project approval in 1979.

The new facility would be 15,661 square feet and include a large assembly area, education area, bbq facilities, storage room and office space. There will also be parking, landscaping and open space trails including a section of the multi-use Orcutt Creek Trail. According to the County's Executive Summary of the project, OASIS would

allow for programs from 9AM to 9:30PM, seven days a week, with the majority of programs and activities happening during the week. Attendance to all events would be limited to 200 persons. As part of the approval, OASIS would be allowed five special events for members per year, and only seven non-OASIS special events would be allowed annually.

E a c h o f t h e commissioners explained that they had spoken with several community members, OASIS staff, and several had visited the site.

Laurie Tamura, of Urban Planing Concepts, Inc., and principal planner for the project explained that if the site was left to development by the County under the open space designation, it

would have an access road, parking, bathrooms, planning fields and a park. "The applicant (OASIS) brings all those assets, and in addition, a community center, which is needed by the area," says Tamura.

A group of citizens called Friends of Key Site 18 have been vocal in their opposition to the proposal based on the site's original designation as open space, increased traffic in the area and the noise impact to the surrounding housing developments. Attorneys representing the group countered that the project makes an unprecedented request to the County to undo years and years of policy to keep this location as open space.

Several community members attended and commented at the public via technology meeting. Deanne Rosing told the Commission, "I live in Southpoint Estates. I selected this home because of the beautiful views of the Orcutt area. We understood when we purchased this house that the site was designated as open space. We read the Orcutt Community Plan and chose this home because of the open space designation. All this is changing. I am a senior citizen, and I'm not opposed to a senior center, just not at this location."

Others expressed support for the new location. Several members of OASIS commented about the programs that OASIS brings to the community and its need for increase space as the needs of the community grow with an aging population.

Orcutt Area Seniors In Service (OASIS) was founded back in the 1950's by a group of local seniors with the goal of serving other seniors in northern Santa Barbara County. OASIS has grown to serve over 5,000 local individuals and families with outings, educational programs, fitness classes and meal programs.

Fourth District Commissioner Larry Ferini, who represents the district the OASIS Center resides, said, "The site is walking distance from Old Orcutt and its proximity is an asset. There is no other site that offers the architecture and setting that this does."

In his dissent, Commissioner Cooney mentioned that, "When there is thought put into saving open space for future generations, we should be very careful about that. For me, that requires a "no" vote.

No date has been set for the Board of Supervisors hearing.

Mateo Ray: Orcutt's New Little Rising Star

Mateo Ray Garcia, (stage name, Mateo Ray) enjoys watching movies but likes "even more to be in them." Mateo, 7, and parents moved to Orcutt last year from the East Bay, closer to relatives and closer to Los Angeles for acting work. His resume fills an entire page as he has been working since age 4 and accrued enough jobs for his own SAG, Screen Actors Guild, card. Mateo exudes stage presence. With his mop of blonde curly hair and cherub angel face, he is happy to demonstrate tap dancing and karate, play the harmonica, tell a few jokes and

cuddle with his dogs. He hams it up with sunglasses, admitting, "I love to sign autographs." Life in Orcutt includes acting classes with SLO studio Actor's Edge's Aaron Metchik, who taught local Zach Ephron among others. Other classes, all zoom, include: piano, karate, and Spanish as well as regular school.

A recent movie, "The Divisible," 25 minutes, received multiple awards in the U.S. and internationally. It is available free at www.thedivisible.com/ watch-film. Mateo plays the son of a biracial couple in this fast paced dystopian drama, a role he got when he agreed to dye his curls brown. His part ranges from happy and care-free to high drama. In one scene his father is carrying him as both parents run for their lives. Mateo's character is deathly sick and unconscious. Asked if he peeked during reshoots of the scene he admits he did. "Kind of. I wanted to see what was happening ... but nobody ever saw." He added, "and it was very bumpy."

Mateo's first feature length film, 40: The Temptation of Christ, premiered Easter 2020. Completely based on scripture, he plays young Jesus who, at one point in the film, teaches his earthly father, Joseph, that sin has caused our separation from God, a speech that showcases Mateo's acting ability. The movie can be streamed on Amazon Prime.

Mateo's mom, Sarah, is a local educational law attorney and his dad, Christopher, was career military with tours in Iraq and 10 years in military police security, followed by being an engineer at Lockheed Martin. Now retired, Christopher's full time job is assisting Mateo. A relative, who knew of an agent, deemed Mateo, at 4, a "natural." His first job was a SF Giant's ad, followed by Lexus and Lego. Now he has 3 agents and a manager and Dad organizes and helps rehearse the lines for a stream of auditions. This day there would be two. Mateo describes having 3 dogs, 1 cat and 6 chickens. He likes his house in Orcutt. "It has a bigger backyard and a fountain." And "I love making new friends here." When asked what roles he'd like to play when he gets older he says "Super Hero." His wish for right now: "I am trying to hit 2000 followers on Instagram.' As of this writing he has 1,918. If you want to help him get to 2000 look up @mateoray_official.

Orcutt Schools Update

When Students are Back in School

Since COVID-19 caused school closures last spring, we educators have looked forward to the day when we would be able to have our students back on campus. While we began the 2020-2021 school year in the format of distance learning, we do expect to be able to resume in-person instruction in the near future. This column will detail how Orcutt schools will open their doors to students in a way that protects everyone's safety and health.

Having students return to school is not a decision our district can make on its own. Under the governor's new color-coded system for rating the spread of COVID-19 by county, Santa Barbara County must be out of the "purple" rating signifying widespread cases for 14 days in order for its schools to re-open for students. As of this writing, our county has a purple rating, but metrics have improved and it is possible our county will improve to a red rating (signifying substantial cases) by the time you read this.

When we are cleared to have students, we will not be able to have all of them back at once. County Public Health Department guidelines dictate that we limit the number

of people on campus in order to enable physical distancing, so we will implement a blend of in-person instruction and distance learning. We would stay on the schedule we have now for distance learning, with one huge exception: Student cohorts will attend school in person on mornings when they now are participating in live virtual meetings with their classroom teacher(s). Students will have a shortened school day in order to give teachers time to interact virtually with students who were not on site that morning.

Opening classrooms to students will be executed in a careful, phased manner in grades TK-8. We will begin with our youngest students – at our elementary and K-8 schools, those in transitional kindergarten and kindergarten; at our junior high schools, seventh grade – and work our way up from there. Because its students take such a cross-section of classes, Orcutt Academy High School will need to launch the blended schedule for all of its students at the same time.

Testing for COVID-19 is required for reopening, and the district's Health Services

Department is working on a system for periodically testing staff and doing daily screenings of students, staff, and all visitors to our schools. Meanwhile, grab-and-go meals will continue to be available for free at each of our school sites for youth of age 18 and under. And the district will continue to offer a 100% distance learning option for families who opt to continue to keep their children at home.

In all of this, our district will follow a comprehensive re-opening plan developed by our district administrators and submitted to the County Public Health Department. The plan accounts for distancing in and out of the classroom, intensified efforts at cleaning and sanitizing, training of students and staff, protocols for when someone has COVID-19, and much more. Staff ranging from principals to maintenance workers to custodians have been working for weeks to implement this plan.

"We've increased training, increased staffing, purchased specialty equipment for disinfecting things, and added disinfectants that are safer to use around children," says Bret Cupp, the district's lead custodian. "It's


literally changed our entire mindset. We are totally focused on how safe and disinfected things are."

Preparing for the return of students is a collaborative effort. Our district management team regularly discusses and reviews elements of our re-opening plan. At sites, our administrators, teachers, and Classified employees are working together to give students a return that is at once safe, welcoming, and comforting.

"We want our kids to come back to an environment that keeps them safe and nurtures them both academically and emotionally," says Jonathan Dollahite, principal of Lakeview Junior High School. "For example, we have been working to set up classrooms in a way that allows students to be distanced but also to engage with each other.

"This is an important effort. For our students, going back to school will be another step in a transition back to normal."

Here's hoping that my next column can report on a happy, healthy reunion of students, teachers, and staff on Orcutt's campuses. The educators of Orcutt cannot wait to be back among the most important people in our school district. 
