Construction Begins on Multi-Use Project Near Orcutt Expressway

A new development project, just north of early 2023. Director Ng relates that, "This is the Skyway/Highway 135 intersection is being called "fresh, energizing and progressive," according to Santa Maria Community Development Director Chuen Ng.

Conceptually approved by the Santa Maria City Council in 2018, the 4 acre Lakeview Promenade project broke ground this summer and will be developed over the next year to year and a half. Currently, the project is in its first stages of actual development with grading and some concrete work. If all goes well, a mash-up of 166 residential units, some commercial and green spaces will be available in 2022 or

a unique project, one that has progressive ideas and will add a new vibe to the Orcutt area." One of these progressive ideas is called vertical mixed-use.

This proposed vertical mixed-use project allows for a variety of uses within the same building. In this case, residential units will be mixed in with about 6,600 sq. ft. of zoning for commercial units. No word yet on how many tenants or names of tenants on the commercial side. The lower floors typically house the commercial units while upper floors are designated for private use.

PROPOSED AIRPORT ZONING think they will not be affected should **CHANGES COULD AFFECT ORCUTT**

As usual, the local government has chosen to obfuscate a contentious issue from those of us who will be most affected by it.

On August 17th the Santa Maria City Council has adopted an ordinance, brought to their attention by the Santa Maria Airport board, that will amend the official zoning map, specific plan map, and general plan land use map for the 28 acres located at the NW corner of Orcutt Expressway (135) and Union Valley Parkway. The adoption of this ordinance gives RRM Design Group the ability to rezone the property from community facilities and open space/ detention basin TO Airport Commercial, light industrial & recreational, open space/ detention basin. The airport commercial/ light industrial will, no doubt, be of most importance.

Anyone who lives in Orcutt who might

think again. The airport board plans to do the same with ALL the property it owns from Hwy. 135 West to Blosser Road and North to Foster & beyond to Skyway. All of this property is currently being leased to growers.

At the moment, Department of Fish & Game is holding up the permit due to the recent discovery of aerial photos that show destruction of sensitive habitat by the Airport Board.

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Las Flores Ranch Park: Loaded With Trails and Ready for Halloween

Fairly new to Orcutt, I decided to explore Las Flores Ranch Park (LFRP).

Jim Batterson, Orcutt resident and volunteer for LFRP, led a morning hike introducing people to the park. With two dogs, I drove east on Clark, then right to 6271 Dominion Road. We parked and hiked to the Visitors' Center to sign up and meet the group. The 1,774-acre park, open Thursday through Sunday 8 AM to 6 PM, and shorter hours in winter, has 15 miles of trails. It's free for Santa Maria residents and now, since possibly 2022 or beyond.

Jim started the hike showing us The Dinosaur Trail, a short loop great for young kids. There's a climbing toy that looks like dinosaur bones coming out of the ground with outdoor bathroom facilities and a covered area with picnic table.

Next, we climbed into majestic rolling hills of mature oaks, grassy valleys, flowering bushes and sweeping views of the surrounding area. Luckily the dogs got tired so we had to rest a few times in the shade of large trees. Jim pointed out where pumpkins are busily growing for "The Patch," an event that will take place Friday - Sunday in October from 10 AM to 6:30 PM. The Patch, established in 2017, provides free agricultural programs to local high school students. Pumpkins are grown and available to buy on these weekends. In addition, there will be succulents, an educational exhibit, a one-acre corn maze and weekly promotions including kid activity zones with jump houses, game area and "a spooky walk through." More Halloween related fun at LFRP is a night hike,

COVID, it's also free for Orcutt residents until sometime before Oct 31, that will be lit by carved pumpkins.

> Other educational and hands on opportunities include a program that plants oak trees grown by student volunteers including the girl scouts. Saplings are started from acorns at the park! Students on field trips will plant the young trees and get to see them grow.

> Every few months there are guided twilight hikes, star gazing events with up to 14 telescopes, docent led; nature hikes, river trail walks, full moon hikes and bike rides. Horses are allowed in LFRP, but you must bring your own. It's not a petting zoo but you can also visit the 2 burros; Solomon and Mojave, a pony, a horse and tree climbing goats.

> For geocachers, LFRP is a gold mine with about 40 hidden treasures of various difficulties. Download the app "GEOCACHING" and you will find the treasure maps as long as you have internet access, maybe a bit higher up than the visitor center, or buy Geocaching Premium. "Download the list and coordinates at home if you don't have the premium app," says Batterson, an avid geochacher.

One day, after the guided hike, I decided to go by myself. I downloaded the app Outer Spatial, as suggested by the City Of Santa Maria website. I located the LFRP map and found trails listed. One, "Quick Loop," 3 miles, looked interesting. Thankfully the app kicked in after I started because I didn't have internet at the Visitors Center. My terrible sense of direction was corrected many times as I was able to watch the circle on the map (me) to be sure not to get lost. One of the perks at LFRP is that staff are aware of who is there and will come find you if you don't sign out. Speaking of volunteers, they are much needed for: docents, trail patrol, field trips. Information on how to volunteer and all events can be found at: https://www.cityofsantamaria. org/city-government/departments/recreationand-parks/upcoming-events. The hike, by the way, was gorgeous. At one point, in the quiet of all that beauty, I looked down to see two women on horseback winding down a path between clusters of oaks set off by distant mountains, blue sky above. I give Los Flores Ranch Park five stars!

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Orcutt Schools Update

A New Way of Electing School Boards

The Orcutt Union School District is transitioning to a new system for electing members of its board of trustees.

Up to now, our school district has had "at large" elections in which all district voters cast ballots for every seat on the board. In May 2018, our school board approved a resolution that began the process of moving to "by-trustee-area" elections. By-trustee-area elections will subdivide the district into "trustee areas," with voters casting ballots only for the seat representing their area of residence.

Why is our district taking this step?

Simply put, the district needs to become compliant with the California Voting Rights Act. Signed into law in 2001, the law makes it easier for minority groups to sue governments or governmental agencies that use at-large elections on the rationale that these elections dilute the strength of minority voters. If Orcutt does not move to a by-trustee-area system for electing its school board, it risks litigation that will force such a change.

Orcutt certainly is not alone in needing to revamp its election format. As Orcutt residents will know, the City of Santa Maria recently moved to a system whereby council members are elected by council area and the mayor is elected at large. According to David Lopez, whose Irvinebased Cooperative Strategies firm is providing demography services to assist Orcutt in developing trustee areas, over 75 school districts around California are in the midst of making this transition.

How will the process proceed?

At this time, we are seeking input from Orcutt Union School District stakeholders on this change. From our district website, www.orcutt-schools.net, we have made accessible a survey in English and Spanish that enables respondents to give feedback on the development of boundaries to establish the initial trustee areas. The survey invites ideas on which streets, highways, and landmarks could serve as natural boundaries. It also asks participants to list benefits and concerns about having trustee areas.

With input from the survey and fresh data from the 2020 U.S. Census, Lopez and his colleagues will develop multiple scenarios for trustee areas that contain a nearly equal number of residents, are contiguous, and follow natural and man-made geographic features. These scenarios will be presented to district trustees and the public, with questions and input taken, at two public hearings in December.

At a third public hearing in January, the school board will select a trustee area map and formally adopt the new system of electing trustees by area. The board's plan will go to the County Committee on School District Organization for final approval in February, and the first election utilizing the new trustee areas will be in November 2022.

"Orcutt's district boundaries lend themselves well to drawing lines," says Lopez, a Santa Maria native who is familiar with the area. "The district includes Orcutt, parts of Santa Maria, Los Alamos, and Casmalia. We are envisioning trustee areas with around 7,400 people in each."

Trustee areas represent a huge change in the way district voters elect our school board. In the months to come we will be sure to keep everyone informed on this transition in this column, on our district website, and in other venues.

As for the open space, there will be about a half-acre with a central common area with patios and decks. Add to that three quarters acres of landscaping including about 4,000 sq. ft. of green roofs. Santa Maria, as a community, has been in a growth mode for some years and this is just one example of how it is keeping pace with larger cities like San Francisco who have used the vertical mixed-use concept for years.

On the feasibility of such a progressive project, Ng said, "There is a demand by younger professionals working from home for places with little yard maintenance, and space to enjoy outdoor dining or shopping that brings people together. Santa Maria is still growing but we're doing it in a way to provide housing options."

The city has responsibility over land use and provides standards for developers. City planners collaborated with the developer Vernon Group who then hired an architect. Hearings followed with planning commission and city council hearings. Neighboring businesses were invited to share their thoughts. Some initial concerns with the project were added traffic congestion. A traffic study was undertaken to make sure it was functional. There will be adjustments to signalization lights at Skyway and the 135. "It shouldn't be too big of an impact" stated Ng.

The pandemic hasn't affected the process much. Work spaces are distanced. All CAL-OSHA requirements are followed. Ng said, "It's Business as usual except for health protocols."

In the end director Ng said, "It's important to facilitate good development and good communities and ensure a high quality of life in Santa Maria."
